

# In The Garden: Project Bloom About The Exhibit



Flowers and vegetation have long served as inspiration for artists around the world. Taking care of a garden is a lot of work, and so is making art. Because both of these things take so much time and patience, it helps us to appreciate them even more! In The Garden transports viewers to warm, flourishing, outdoor spaces and encorages them to think about the sites, smells, textures, and emotions associated with being in the garden!

### In The Garden: Project Bloom Lesson Overview

This lesson aims to connect students to their personal identity through color psychology and personal value systems. Students will watch a video on color symbolism, and fill out the color symbolism sheet (page 4). After this first step, students will use the second part of the worksheet to write about 20 things that are important to them/things that make them unique. These things are called, "values." Finally, students will connect their own values to colors from the color symbolism portion of their worksheet. Students will use this worksheet when creating their final projects during the live portion of the lesson. For the final project, students will create paper flowers which will become part of a permanent community art installation at the Canton Museum of Art called, "Project Bloom!"

What is Project Bloom?
Project Bloom is a community art project celebrating the various people that make our community special! For Project Bloom, Stark County students, workers, community members, organizations, and museum patrons are asked to make a flower, and leave it at the museum to be hung in an installation that will evolve throughout the course of our exhibits, "In The Garden," and "Dancing In The Light: Masterworks of American Impressionism." All the flowers, like every member of our community, are different. Project Bloom celebrates and promotes diversity through unique personal expression.

#### Lesson Procedure

- \*A certified CMA instructor will meet with the class via Google Meet for a 30-40 minute lesson
- \*Students will participate in a virtual tour of the exhibit, "In The Garden."
- \*Students will receive materials from their teacher while the tour is being given.
- \*Students will be prompted to think about the ways they are unique, which should correspond to the pre-lesson worksheet on page 4.
- \* Students will use their pre-lesson worksheet to make 20 petals of different colors based on the colors they assigned to their personal values on the pre-lesson worksheet.
- \*Students will write their values on each corresponding petal, and decorate their petals further if they choose. \*At the end of the lesson, students will compare their flowers and discuss how they are all different even though each student used the same materials.

#### Each Student Will Need:

- \*Petal template (included in kit)
- \*Sheets of paper corresponding to colors on the pre-lesson worksheet (page 4)
- \*Pre-Lesson Worksheet (page 4)
- \*A cardboard circle (included in kit)
- \* Glue Stick (included in kit)
- \*Glitter gel pens (included in kit)
- \*Scissors

#### Optional:

- \*Personal Markers, colored pencils, pens, etc.
- \*Fun embellishmets (glitter, pom-poms, etc)
- \*Anything else that could help get students in the art-making spirit!

#### Teachers:

In the days leading up to your lesson, you will receive a link to a Google Meet from the Canton Museum of Art in your email. A certified CMA instructor will lead your students through an art-making lesson over Google Meet, and will pick up the finished projects at your convenience to live on as part of Project Bloom!

## Post Lesson Discussion (or writing assignment!)

Did you learn anything about yourself today?
